

The Sacraments and Christian Life

Objective

By the end of the lesson, students will be able to:

- 1. Understand the meaning of the word Sacrament.
- 2. Identify the origin of the sacraments and their connection to Jesus.
- 3. Recognize how sacraments work in our spiritual life.
- 4. Learn how to prepare and receive sacraments effectively.
- 5. Appreciate sacraments as pathways to holiness and eternal life.

Introduction

Introduce the chapter:

Start with questions:

- "When you hear the word Sacrament, what comes to your mind?"
- "How many sacraments do we have in the Church?" (let them list)
- "Which sacraments can be received multiple times, and which only once?"

Presentation of the Topic

(a) What is a Sacrament?

A sacrament is an outward sign, instituted by Christ, to give grace.

Break it down:

<u>Outward sign (</u> something visible),
Instituted by Christ (Jesus began them)
<u>Gives grace</u> (brings God's life into us).

(b) Origin of the Sacraments

Sacraments are not man-made traditions; they come from Jesus Himself.

Examples:

- 1. Baptism Jesus was baptized in the Jordan.
- 2. Eucharist Jesus instituted it at the Last Supper.
- 3. Confession Jesus gave His disciples the power to forgive sins (Jn 20:22–23).
- 4. Matrimony Jesus blessed the wedding at Cana.

(c) Effect of Sacraments

- They transform us spiritually.
- They strengthen our relationship with God and with the Church.
- They prepare us for eternal life.

Use an analogy: Sacraments are like charging stations—we cannot keep running on empty; we need God's grace to live as Christians.

(d) How to Receive Sacraments Effectively

Preparation is important:

Prayer, confession, right intention.

Purity of heart and soul. Not just external rituals (white dress, candles, rings)

State of Grace: being free from mortal sin so that grace can flow.

Discussion Questions:

- 1. If we only dress in white but have sin in our hearts, do we truly reflect Christ?
- 2. Which sacrament do you feel is most important in your life right now? Why?
- 3. What preparations can you make to receive the Eucharist or Confession more meaningfully?

Habit Formation

Resolution for the week:

As a baptized child of God, I will prepare myself well and receive the sacraments worthily, remembering that it is Jesus Himself whom I receive.

Agtivity

Signs and Symbols of the Sacraments

Divide students into small groups (or pairs).

Assign each group/ child one sacrament. Ask them to write/draw the signs & symbols of that sacrament and what they signify.

Baptism – Water (cleansing), Candle (light of Christ), White garment (purity).

Eucharist - Bread & wine (Body & Blood of Christ).

Confirmation - Oil/Chrism (seal of the Spirit).

Confession – Absolution (forgiveness).

Anointing of the Sick - Oil (healing & strength).

Matrimony – Rings (unity), Vows (commitment).

Holy Orders - Laying on of hands (authority & mission).
